Achieving 'no net land take' in Europe: Are we on the right track?

Background

In 2011, the European Commission announced, that "by 2020, EU policies take into account their direct and indirect impact on land use in the EU and globally, and the rate of land take is on track with an aim to achieve no net land take by 2050" (COM (2011) 571). However, how this 'no net land take' goal should be reached has remained an open question till today and recent data by the European Environment Agency (EEA) show that rates of land take are still high in the EU.

Against this backdrop the research project SURFACE (Standards and Strategies for the Reduction of Land Consumption 2017-2021) focuses on quantitative aspects of soil and land protection in Europe. We study whether and how selected member states strive for increasing land-use efficiency and reducing land take in the context of urbanization and infrastructure development. On the basis of our research, we aim at generating stimuli for activities at the European level that could help reducing land take. The SURFACE project is funded by the Germany Federal Environment Agency (UBA), run at the Helmholtz-Centre for Environmental Research - UFZ by an interdisciplinary team with expertise in economics, legal science and nature conservation and supported by several international experts that are involved via surveys and workshops.
